# CULTURAL SAFETY & HUMILITY GRANTS PROGRAM

The BCCFP honours the rich cultural and traditional practices that are integral to Indigenous identity and recognizes the ongoing impact of historical injustices on the health and well-being of Indigenous Peoples in what we now call British Columbia.

We are committed to continual learning and advocating for culturally safe health care to address health inequities.

As part of this work, and our ongoing Declaration of Commitment to reconciliation, we created the BCCFP Cultural Safety Grants Program in February 2022. This year, we are excited to announce that we have expanded the Cultural Safety Grants Program, with seven grants of up to \$5,000 each and an additional three grants of up to \$10,000 each.

These grants have fostered impactful and meaningful work, building and strengthening relationships between family physicians and Indigenous communities across BC.

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#### **SUPPORTING CULTURAL SAFETY AND HUMILITY**

We hope inspiration can be drawn from these examples and that they ignite meaningful action towards Reconciliation efforts in BC and beyond.

# A place of welcome: expressing care, safety and humility through patient intake forms (Surrey-Langley)

A collaborative initiative in Fraser Health, engaging over a dozen family physicians and health equity consultants to integrate cultural safety and humility into patient intake processes. The project included gathering insights from Indigenous-created resources, revising intake forms through a cultural safety lens, and implementing changes in practice. It will culminate in a knowledge-sharing event in October 2024 to guide other family physicians in adopting culturally safe practices.

#### Cowichan Maternity Clinic Indigenous Reconnection & Primary Care Network Priority Attachment (Duncan)

A jointly funded project aimed at enhancing maternity care services for Indigenous families through better integration with primary care. The team worked collaboratively on consultations and reporting, culminating in a community meeting on February 29, 2024, beautifully captured by Indigenous artist Lise Gillies in a graphical recording.







## Integrated locally planned cultural safety KAIROS blanket exercise

(Lillooet)

In partnership with Interior Health, this project delivered the KAIROS blanket exercise, facilitated by Tit'qet leaders and Elders of the St'at'imc Nation. Designed to introduce cultural safety concepts to Lillooet physicians, the initiative fostered collaboration among healthcare and community leaders, with many participants noting its immediate impact on patient care in emergency settings.

## Journey Home Project: Knowledge translation for the next generation of Palliative Care Providers (Saanich)

In collaboration with the  $\underline{W}$ SÁNEĆ Nation, this project shared learnings from the palliative care Journey Home Project with non-Indigenous providers at Saanich Peninsula Hospital and surrounding practices. It produced a toolkit featuring Indigenous-specific resources, fostering greater understanding of palliative care as a specialty in family medicine.

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## St. Paul's Hospital Perinatal Substance Use Program

(Vancouver)

The BCCFP portion of this jointly funded project enabled a family physician specializing in maternity care to work together with Indigenous community partners at Kilala Lelum Urban Indigenous Health Centre and members of the Indigenous Wellness team at St. Paul's Hospital to incorporate learnings from Indigenous patients into the work of the Perinatal Substance Use program.

#### Continuation of the Prince George Cultural Humility and Competency Working Group

(Prince George)

Focused on advancing cultural safety, this project supported the Prince George Cultural Safety Working Group during its grant application process. Despite closing early due to leadership transitions, it achieved significant milestones, including creating patient-facing videos and installing Indigenous artwork in urgent care spaces, enhancing inclusivity and cultural safety for patients.



#### Cowichan District Hospital Emergency Department Cultural Humility Learning and Development Plan Community Engagement Project

(Duncan)

A jointly funded project to co-create a Cultural Humility
Learning and Development Plan for the Emergency Room
of Cowichan District Hospital in collaboration with local
Quw'utsun leaders and Elders. Representatives from Cowichan
Tribes, Malahat Nation, Halalt First Nation, Lyackson First
Nation, Stz'uminus First Nation, Penelakut Tribe, Ditidaht
First Nation, Pacheedaht First Nation, Ts'uubaa-asatx Nation
and Cowichan Valley Métis First Nation were all contacted to
participate in interviews that would inform the new Cultural
Humility Learning and Development Plan.

#### **MY FAMILY DOCTOR AWARD**

The My Family Doctor Award is nominated by patients and celebrates the doctor-patient relationship that supports good health. Five family physicians —one from each geographic health authority – received this year's award:











**Dr. Jessica Zimbler**– Prince George

Practising in Prince George for over 15 years as a full-service family physician, Dr. Jessica Zimbler is an "an unwavering source of support and guidance" for her patients who one of her nominators describes as "embodying extraordinary dedication, compassion, and expertise".

**Dr. Alison MacInnes** 

Vancouver

Dr. Alison MacInnes is a distinguished family physician with over 25 years of dedicated service in Vancouver, who, according to one of her nominators, "makes the world a better place...one patient encounter at a time."

**Dr. Moa Sugimoto**– Lumby

Dr. Moa Sugimoto is a Vernon-based family physician who "goes above and beyond to take care of her community members" in the village of Lumby. "Kindness, thoroughness, intelligence, empathy and availability – if only all British Columbians could be as fortunate as we are to have Dr. Sugimoto in our community."

**Dr. Pravjot Nijjar** - Burnaby

Dr. Pravjot Nijjar is a family physician who, according to one of her nominators, has "profound impact" on her patients through "exceptional care and dedication." Dr. Nijjar is recognized for her ability to "integrate new findings and treatments into our care plans," which one nominator describes as having "provided me and my family with the best possible outcomes."



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
